As I write this, we are 18 months into a pandemic that has certainly been impactful on each and every one of us. We have lost Brothers to the Chapter Eternal, and RPI remains under strict COVID protocols.

Despite the RPI Administration mandating all Greek Chapter houses to be unoccupied from Thanksgiving 2020 until August 2021, as a private business, LAE and a handful of other Fraternity's Alumni along with the Alumni Fraternity and Sorority Council (AFC), created a protocol to keep private chapter houses open with limited occupancy. The residences that remained open had zero COVID incidences. I would like to thank the board members of LAE and the undergraduate students of NY Epsilon for their perseverance in the face of adversity.

We are forging ahead with our house renovation project financed by both the Lion's Fund and the Preserving Our Past, Protecting Our Future Campaign. I would like to thank the generous alumni who have pledged throughout the past 35 years through our annual phonathon, including those who contributed during our Capital Campaign – it is because of your generosity that we are well positioned to be the premiere residence on RPI's campus, and also why we are able to weather storms such as this pandemic.

Within the last few weeks, RPI administration has announced they intend to shift to a "virtual" homecoming for this upcoming Fall 2021 homecoming weekend. Despite this, we still plan to host an in-person Homecoming / Alumni Gathering on Saturday, October 9th 2021 at 12 Myrtle Ave. The annual LAE Shareholder's Meeting will be at 1 PM that Saturday at the chapter house. We also have a social gathering planned that evening at the Ruck (Sutter's), with the top two floors privately reserved.

There will be a Zoom feed for the Shareholder's meeting for anyone who cannot make it to Troy. A link to the meeting will be provided on the chapter website and the Facebook alumni page. Please join us for detailed updates on the campaign, renovation project, and future of NY Epsilon and the Greek Community at Rensselaer.


UPCOMING SHAREHOLDERS MEETING

UPDATE ON PRESERVING OUR PAST, PROTECTING OUR FUTURE CAMPAIGN

As of July 2021, the campaign has received \$921,180 in donations, with \$487,600 to the SAE Foundation Chapter allocation fund, and \$433,580 to the LAE building fund. This is from 132 generous alumni. We will generate a new honor roll for the October LAE chapter meeting, but wanted to recognize some donors who we had mistakenly misreported. John Majane '53 had donated \$3,000 to the Chapter Allocation Fund in memory of Robert Weeks '51. Before Paul DeVivo '64 passed on the Chapter Eternal in March 2021, he had made an additional donation in memory of Wayne Chittenden '62. Both brothers are at the Brotherhoods Society Level having donated between \$2,500-\$4,999.

To begin to transition off active the campaign and back to revised annual support like our phonathon, we've investigated taking advantage of a new (finally) way to donate to frate nities and sororities via RPI. We set up a RPI Sigma Alpha



Epsilon Chapter Support Fund, to which alumni can make tax deductible donations, take advantage of corporate matching, and have the money directed for use by LAE and NYEP for student life and housing needs. This comes with a little more flexibility than we have with the Chapter Allocation Fund that we set up with SAE Foundation to help fund the chapter houser renewal construction project costs. It does come with the RPI management fee of 10% upon disbursement, but the AFSC and other chapter making use of the new fund felt the opportunity for corporate matching and more options for use of the funds was worth that expense charge. And with Pres. Jackson leaving next summer, it is an opportunity to rebuild some bridges and relations to support for RPI. 

PHOENIX TASK FORCE UPDATE

The Building Project Committee (internally called the Phoenix Task Force) has re-engaged with both the architect and the preferred contractor, **CGM** Construction. We've now begun the preconstruction process, and are currently focused on identifying scope risks, updating budgets, and determining the most cost effective phasing plan.
